It is at the General Conference level that the United Methodist beliefs, organizational structures, and way of life are all established. Delegates from each Annual Conference on earth gather once every four years to set the policies, vision, and governing rules of the United Methodist Church. It is the General Conference that adopts The United Methodist Book of Discipline, which governs all United Methodist congregations and structures. This book contains the definitive United Methodist Articles of Faith, historical Statements, bylaws, organizational structures, and social principles. General Conference will soon be held in Portland, Oregon, on May 10-20, 2016. What an exciting time! Headlines will be made...be watching the news. Better yet, follow General Conference more closely. A special treat is that our very own MN bishop, Bruce Ough, is currently serving as the president of the College of Bishops, and he will convene General Conference!

As United Methodists, we certainly don't agree on everything. This will be true at General Conference, too. I'm sure the cultural "hot topics" will receive the majority of the media attention. Even so, the United Methodist Church's strength comes not from everyone thinking alike, but from our commitment to "be one" together. John Wesley, the founder of the United Methodist Church, coined the phrase, "agree to disagree," referring to how Christians don't have to all think alike on non-essential issues of faith. That is a defining hallmark of our unity. We don't all think alike (Hillary Clinton and George W. Bush are both United Methodists!). Yet we are united by Jesus' command to "love one another."

No matter who you are, you probably won't like everything that happens at General Conference. Yet we remain committed to love one another, to agree to disagree on non-essential issues of faith, and "be one" just as Jesus prayed we would be (John 17:20). Even though this doesn't always happen among Christians, let's commit to living this way at least in our own lives. That's a great way to be a United Methodist!

Worship's Word

When I was growing up, May was always an exciting month. There were always a lot of different things happening during May. On the farm calves were being born, planting in the fields and the garden was happening, and I was on the alert for litters of kittens hidden away in the hay bales. In school we were wrapping things up for the year, going on our last field trips, and getting excited for summer vacation. Things aren't the same now as they were then, but I still get excited during this month. May is when I really start to feel like spring is here, and winter starts to fade to a distant memory.

When spring comes we have expectations, we have our thoughts of how it's going to go, but reality doesn't always line up with those expectations. We think about days that are warm, but not hot, gentle rain showers, and bursts of green as the grass grows and the trees bud. Many years that's exactly how it goes. But then you have the years when spring does not live up to your expectations. Those years when it seems to go straight from winter to summer, 30 degrees one day and 80 degrees the next. Or the spring when it just won't stop raining and instead of burst of green we have flooded roads and lawns to deal with. Or the spring that seems perfect, but then we have a blizzard in the middle of May.

In our sermon series Pastor David is talking about the open door. God opens doors in front of us, and when we go through those doors we always have expectations about what is going to be on the other side. Maybe it's the new job that you know will be perfect, or the relationship that you know is the one, or the school that's going to start you on the path to your lifelong career. Sometimes when we get on the other side of those doors we find things much like we expected them, 70 degrees and sunny. But often we find the unexpected, the blizzard that comes from nowhere. When our experiences aren't living up to our expectations, this is when we need to learn to trust. To trust that the one who opened the door in front of us will see us through it. Sometimes that means trusting that the God who redeemed that world can also redeem this situation. Sometimes it means trusting that the God who opened the door to where we are now will be faithful to open another door as well. In all things and at all times we need to remember that God didn't promise us that it would always be easy, but instead that God will always be faithful.

Spiritual Growth

We all know how the common saying goes, "April Showers...bring May flowers!" I for one have never been more aware of how true that statement is than this year. We spent most of April with very little water falling from the sky and equally as few buds forming on the trees or sprouting from the grounds. Then suddenly just over a week ago we got a full day of rain, which has since led to a couple of weeks of moisture. That first rain really stood out to me though. It was a good full rain, the kind that made the earth smell good and look refreshed. Then the very next day after this first rain I noticed that our neighborhood had come alive overnight new growth had sprouted everywhere and it was beautiful. The earth had soaked in the life giving water and had turned it into stunning new life.

Much like the trees and flowers our lives need living water to nourish us and soak us with the ability to grow, flourish and have new life. Jesus talks directly in John 4 about how he is this living water for us. In the narrative he comes to a well in the middle of the afternoon and finds a Samaritan woman alone and asks her for a drink of water from the well. The woman is surprised that Jesus, a Jewish man, would ask her, a Samaritan woman, for a drink. She makes her astonishment known and Jesus responds by speaking to her about a different kind of water than what is in the well. In John 4:13-14 Jesus says to the woman, "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life." Jesus is telling the woman that He is the water that gives new life. This is why for me it is important to have spiritual practices and ways of spending time with Jesus, so that I might be soaked by his living water and grown new buds.

So as we watch April showers bring about May flowers may we remember that Jesus is the true living water in our lives. And, may we keep ourselves close to the source of that water in the hopes that we will bloom and blossom overnight just as the earth is beginning to do around us.
