

## From the Pastor's Perspective

#### Monthly Church Events

In Jerusalem, there are two places identified where Jesus could have been crucified and buried. The more traditional place is covered by the Church of the Holy Sepulcher. It was constructed in A.D. 324 over the places where Jesus' cross was believed to have stood, as well as the nearby cave in which He was believed to have been buried. This 1,700 year-old building, which now stands in the heart of the Old City, is covered with ancient decorations and layers of holy veneration. Shrines and chapels have been constructed over the holiest of places. Incense fills the air. Chanting and prayers hum in the background. Religious utensils and accessories hang everywhere; gold and silver adorn important places. People tightly wiggle from one shrine to another, sometimes in lines two hours long.

As holy as the place is, the hustle of people and the unfamiliar decor make it hard for folks like me to actually worship there. The cave tomb was landscaped away to expose the ledge on which Jesus was laid. The ledge was then covered in marble, and a marble mausoleum with gold and carvings was constructed over it. Same with the hill of Calvary. It is completely overlaid with marble, and the spot where the cross stood is covered by an ornamented shrine allowing only one person in at time, on their knees. Needless to say, it is nearly impossible to envision the "skull rock" (the meaning of Golgotha) or Jesus' tomb when there.

Outside the old city is a quiet garden. An empty cave tomb was unearthed there in 1867 by a British man. Nearby stands a craggy hill looking like a skull and a grape press suggesting that the area was a garden. This place, called "The Garden Tomb," has been left in its natural state. Even if it is not the right location of Jesus' death and burial, it provides a visual and worshipful experience to celebrate Jesus' sacrifice and resurrection.

Which site is right? We may never know. What is important is that we believe that somewhere in or near these two sites, Jesus died for the salvation of us all. It actually happened. It is a historical reality. It has dirt!

But Easter, actually, doesn't need a location. The proof of Jesus' resurrection is our own personal experience of Him in our lives. So, Easter is wherever we are, whenever we proclaim, "Christ is risen!" We, thousands of miles away from Jerusalem, verify that Jesus is not dead. Easter is real because it changes us, makes us different. It affects how we live, how we behave, what we say, what we do. Easter is dirty still, for it is located wherever we plant our feet.

We are having two witnesses to Jesus' resurrection at Forest Hills this year, too. We are hosting two main (identical) worship services, one at 9:00 a.m. and one at 11:00 a.m. Both are valid. Both will be true worship. Just as the two worship sites stand in Jerusalem bearing witness to Jesus' resurrection, so we will have two worship services bearing witness to our joy in Easter.

There are other festivities planned, too. On Good Friday we will have a prayer service at 7:00 p.m. The Prayer Vigil will begin after the Good Friday service and continue nonstop until Easter morning. At 6:00 a.m. on Easter morning there will be a Sunrise service at Forest Lake Memorial Park to greet the rising of the Son. An hour before each main worship service will be breakfast and the Hunt for Easter at the church.

This Easter, make the spiritual pilgrimage: not to Jerusalem, but to the gatherings of worshipers who witness to Jesus' resurrection at Forest Hills. We don't need an empty tomb for proof. We have the opportunity to meet and experience the living Jesus. Don't miss this opportunity. Your eternal life depends on it!

Jesus declares in Mark 11:17 that God's temple will be called a house of prayer for all nations. Jesus is throwing out merchants and money changers while he says it. Jesus is also quoting the prophet Isaiah as he is wont to do. At the time, the temple was a holy venue. It was the very place where God chose to dwell!

We don't give too much thought to the temple today. We understand that our church building itself is not in any way holy. God has instead brought about a way in which his presence can reside within our hearts. You and I now exist as God's holy temple.

What does that mean for us? Is Jesus throwing merchandise and money out? Is he proclaiming that we ought to live as a house of prayer?

I think so. Prayer is so fundamental, it can never be overstated. It can never be overdone. In fact, the more we do it, the more we see the need for it. I want what Jesus wants: to live my life as a house of prayer. To follow after his example. To encourage others to do the same.

### Speaking in Story

A lot of times in churches, we say things like "we want to do it like Jesus" or we talk about doing ministry like Jesus did. What would it look like if we shifted to make a third of our communication and teaching based on stories?


How do we handle all of this good news? What do we do with all of this glorious truth?
