Easter: Thresholds Opened!

Jesus' death and resurrection threw open closed thresholds! You may remember that the rock that sealed Jesus' tomb was rolled back on Easter. But take a closer look at Matthew 27:50 -53 and you will see miraculous openings at the moment of Jesus' death, too: "Jesus, having cried out again with a loud voice, yielded up His spirit; and behold, the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom; and the earth shook, and the rocks were split; and the tombs were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised, and having come out of the tombs after His resurrection they went into the holy city, and they appeared to many." Once again we see thresholds in the dramatic moments of story of salvation in the Bible. The Temple veil torn: God's very presence is no longer hidden and separated. Rocks split: creation itself torn open in a transformative upheaval. Tombs opened: those who had died in faith were raised back to life. They go back into Jerusalem: resuming normal life, but also taking the miracle of salvation right back into everyday life.

This Easter we'll throw open the barriers that shut us in. We'll proclaim Jesus' resurrection power that splits wide the bondage that holds us back. Our graves are broken open and we look forward to life eternal. Easter is God opening closed doors! We have God's Easter power to open new beginnings. We're included in the Bible's story of salvation. Easter is for you!

So, be sure to come in through our church doors for worship this Easter. It starts on Friday, April 19, at 7 p.m. with our Good Friday worship service. That service starts the Easter Prayer Vigil: we're turning our church building into a 24-hour prayer house! Be sure to sign up for a time to come in and pray, any time from Friday evening through Easter Sunday. Saturday morning, April 20, is the Community Care Food Distribution. We're inviting Community Care folks to be a part of the Prayer Vigil that morning! You can also come that morning to serve and wish folks the blessings of Easter in a very tangible way.

Easter begins with a 6:00 a.m. sunrise worship service at Veteran's Memorial Park, downtown Forest Lake. Back at church, the youth will host the Easter breakfast from 8:00 - 10:00 a.m. as a fund raiser for their summer mission trip to Alaska. The main worship service, at 10:00 a.m., will be filled with overwhelming joy and exuberant celebration. We'll be sent out through open doors to carry the good news of Jesus' resurrection back into our world!

This Easter, open your homes to family and friends to celebrate this triumphant victory. Open your eggs to celebrate the new life that Jesus brings. And open your hearts to the incoming Jesus. May the risen Jesus cross our thresholds to bring His salvation to us. Then, may His Holy Spirit carry us back over them again, out into our daily lives, so we can live as Easter people every day forward. AMT Update

Spring is in the air, birds are singing, temps are rising, snow is melting! It's time to wake from our dormant winter and put on the cloak of newness. Open the door! Let the stale air out and let the breeze blow in fresh air.

Please pray for AMT this weekend as we take time away to seek God, sit with Jesus and be filled by the Holy Spirit! A special thank you to Rev. Janet Morey who will be leading us in our guided meditation time. I will update you next month on how our goals were met for the weekend.

For this month, I would like to share some experiences Amanda Lucas and I have had the past month or so. We were asked by Rev. Cindy Gregorson if we would come and give our testimonies to the upcoming HCI (Healthy Church Initiative) candidates at a dinner at White Bear UMC. There were at least 50 people there from approximately 7 churches, plus our D.S. Rev. Susan Nienaber and Bishop Ough. We also received a couple of emails from churches asking questions about the process. We hope our sharing will allow others the chance to bypass some of the "pitfalls" we dealt with.

Amanda and I shared with everyone our excitement, trepidation, frustration and joy following the acceptance by our church of the recommendations from the HCI Conference committee. We told them of the structural leadership changes that were implemented to simplify our many, many ministry teams and many, many meetings each month. This paring down has not only helped us from being stretched in

in too many different directions, but also freed us to hone in on what God's Plan is for our church, through much prayer and meditation.

Amanda spoke about "How it has all worked": "So far, I'd say from where I sit that it has been very nice having simplified our "chain of command." It has allowed for very little guess work in where to go for what things, etc. That being said, the congregation has at times felt that communication is not what it should be because fewer people are involved...word doesn't get around as well, etc., so making a conscious effort to share updates is extremely important. Eventually there has to be an individual responsibility to stay up-to-date on changes as well.

As I referenced above, our new structure has worked very well but it wasn't always smooth sailing. We've had some personality conflicts within our teams so what I caution in your team selection is to make sure prayer surrounds the entire situation and really discern who should be working where. We didn't appoint every volunteer we received to either of these teams, for various reasons. Make the invitation open but be prepared to sift through the "applicants" when they come in to put together the strongest team possible.

Logistically, having two teams has worked well. I haven't experienced any hiccups in process yet. It's very streamlined. Decision making seems quick; things don't have to bounce to 3 or 4 different teams for approval. One, to the other, and we're done!"

And "What we've learned": "HCI wasn't a fix all or a quick fix so we're still learning. Specifically, for our new two-team structure we've learned that we need to get volunteers from OUTSIDE of the groups to make things run. We cannot run every single ministry we decide to do as our 12-person team. Congregation wide buy-in is absolutely necessary. It is easy to think we have to do it all, we learned that we don't. That is very important.

Transitioning to this structure was difficult sometimes; other times it was easy. Transition is easiest when as much information and explanation is presented as possible to as many people as possible, as many times as possible. You still won't get everyone but you need about a 38% overall buy-in to create acceptance of a new idea, then it takes off.

We've learned that less is definitely more in the running of our church. Going forward, we'll have to decide if we'll keep this structure beyond our 3-year HCl plan and so far I think we will. It has gone very well so far for us."

For my part as lay leader, I mainly spoke about HCI and AMT from my own perspective. "I, wholeheartedly, recommend the HCI process. As Amanda said, it has been hard work, with many hours of discussions, coaching and communicating with our church family.

As the Lay Leader, I have felt that my job was to develop this talented group of people into a unified team. Our main job was to discern what new "dream" or "vision" God had planned for us. Our church family voted all of us in as leaders for this process. We spent a lot of time in prayer. Next, we had to convince the congregation to jump on board with what we discerned. This is an ongoing endeavor. In 2019, our goal is to help each and every ministry of our church develop meaningful ways to Love.Grow.Serve. Each ministry team is required to include all three pieces of our "grounding principles". To do this, we have created a "New Ministry Proposal Form", which also led to a "Current Ministry Evaluation Form". One of our coaches, Rev. Jim Haun, helped us with coaching techniques when speaking to current ministries. Mainly, it was to have an open heart, open mind and hold the ministry accountable to what they say they will do. Our job is to avoid

"fixing" the ministry, listen to what their passion is and help them incorporate the 3 guiding principles into their ministry.

As the Action Ministry Team (AMT), we discerned that God's plan for us was to "make disciples who make more disciples". Rev. David Werner is guiding us into developing a discipleship pathway for all ages and Christian maturity within our church. I see excitement growing within our team as we get the ball rolling. One of the things that has helped us tremendously this past year, has been "going on retreat". Our team has had 2 retreats with another one the end of March. We have been off site, praying and working together, with even an overnight. I have felt unity build during this time of sharing and also find that we accomplish much more there than during our monthly meetings.

I believe Amanda talked about how much our meetings have changed from previous years. As a member of LLMT, I felt our meetings were just about reporting what the ministries under us were doing and passing on pertinent news/needs. The only good part of the meeting was the book study that Pastor David led. Now I find our meetings invigorating. We are talking about God, not about the carpet colors or fellowship hall chairs. We so dearly want to reach people for Christ. With God, we know all things are possible, through Him who knows our every need. I pray that your church will move forward, mightily, with a new vision. The Methodist Church has been shaken up recently, but as Bishop Ough said:

We have committed our lives to the calling from God to lead this church and to offer a gospel of grace and love that is the core of our Wesleyan theology. Our hearts deeply desire to live out this calling with grace and integrity. My heart is broken to see this church that has been our home so divided in this season when all you and I want to do is offer the love of Jesus to all people.

May your church also uphold this same prayer as you move forward with the HCI process."

As always, God is good, all the time!
