

From the Pastor's Perspective

"The woman gave birth to a son and named him Samson. The boy grew up, and the Lord blessed him. The Lord's spirit began to move him "-Judges 13:24-25

Easter is fading into memory, graduation is coming quickly, and we are making our summer plans. If Easter is so important, how do we not let it slip away amid the business of now or get lost in all the planning for what's coming next? How do we live as disciples of Jesus with Easter as our defining reality?

I've been reading a book on Samson. I have to confess; I have never liked the story of Samson. It's a short story deep within the book of Judges. It's at a time in Israel's history after they have left Egypt and settled into the Promised Land, but before they had kings. The people struggled to follow God faithfully, and so God raised up "judges" who led the people to stay close to God.

Now, a "judge" in the Old Testament is not what we think of judges today. Well, maybe a little bit. They did arbitrate disputes when they arose and tried to settle arguments. But most importantly, they were military heroes who led the Israelites to victory against foreign oppressors and who governed the people to follow God.

There was a repeating cycle: 1. As long as a judge ruled, there was peace in the land, both against oppressors and in faithfulness to God. 2. But, when the judge died, the people

fell away from God and started worshipping other, local gods.

3. God stopped protecting the people and let other people attack and subjugate the Israelites. 4. The people repented and turned to God for help in their misery. 5. God hears their cry and raises up a judge. 6. The judge leads the people in driving out the foreign oppressors and calls the people back to worshipping the true God. 7. Back to number 1, the cycle starts over (there are 12 judges mentioned in the Bible, and, interestingly, one was a female—Deborah—who as a military hero was sort of an early Joan of Arc!).

Samson is a judge, but from my reading, only accidently helps free the people from the oppression of the Philistines. He was not a godly man, and if you remember from the "Samson and Delilah" story, he followed his romantic desires more than God. Yet, amazingly, God used him, even with all of his problems. And here is where I'm coming to for my May Sunday message mini-series (3 weeks). I'm forcing myself to preach on Samson (I've scheduled this series purposefully so that I will dive deeply into all of God's Word, and not just stick to the parts I like or understand better). I'm still not sure what all God is going to have me say, but what I am seeing right now is that God is active and working through people even when they struggle to stay close to God.

That's a message of Easter, after all, isn't it? Easter doesn't fix our every flaw or make us perfect disciples. We still struggle to follow Jesus. And stories like Samson remind us—encourage us—that God uses us even when we are not tracking with Him very well. God still accomplishes His will, still fights for His people, still redeems the lost, and in the process, we also find transformation.

Living as Easter people means going through the cycle of the judges in our own hearts, with the good news of God's assurance that He does not tire of our straying to the point of giving up on us. We all have Samson in us! We don't always live the Easter promise well, but the risen Jesus keeps coming to us, working through us, and bringing us back.

Happy Easter, Samson!

AMT Update

The Action Ministry Team (AMT) had a retreat this past March continuing our visioning for Forest Hills. We watched a wonderful Ted Talk by Benjamin Zander about classical music. We tried to bring what he showed us about classical music and compare it to what we need to know about "being a disciple." It may seem strange to find the many similarities between the two. What I found is that, like music, we need to allow the Spirit to move us. In music, the conductor has the power to allow the spirit to move among the musicians and bring out the best in them and the music. God is our conductor, we are the musicians, He has the power to bring out the best in us, if we allow it. Like the conductor, God wants everyone to catch the vision, to see beyond their finite minds and bring heart and soul into creating us into disciples who make other disciples.

One of our goals at the retreat was to define what we mean by an activity verses a ministry of the church. We defined a "ministry" as primarily "making disciples." This would use staff resources and include Worship time, Wednesday Grow Groups, Echo groups, Confirmation, Youth, small accountability groups and more. "Activities" are groups that are largely self-run, and include fellowship groups, essential church building maintenance groups, one-time service activities, and more.

As a team, AMT has promised to help different teams in the church help define where they see themselves fitting in. If groups and teams want to move to more intentionally make disciples, we will help guide and coach them so that their vision can ignite and turn into a flame. A fellowship group may not primarily be making disciples, but it is an important way for folks to interact with others in the church, make friends, and possibly help get people connected to ministry groups.

AMT aims to fan the flame of all the musicians in our church orchestra, so that everyone's gifts from God may be used to the fullest. With God conducting us, we can make the Spirit move and swell among us.

We need all of you to help take this small flame and grow it into a fiery spirit like that first Christian Pentecost in Acts 2:2-3, "Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them."
